

Recommended for readers who want some thoughtful depth as well as entertainment. This book is a thinly-veiled autobiography. The author explains how good R&D is done and what (good and bad) consequences result. His revelations concerning the "Institute" are right on target for the time frame of the novel. Some one should write a similar book that updates that information. His view of the developments and US activities in Chile is thought-provoking. So is the murder mystery! The author provides details of his technical triumphs. They are presented as answers to the journalist's questions. As a chemist/engineer, I thought that this was wonderful. I learned a lot! A person without technical training may get lost.
