

It is not uncommon for new editions of texts to be similar to the previous version with a few added chapters, but this is absolutely NOT the case with Mr. Malekoff's third edition. Group Work with Adolescents, is in my opinion, not only one of the most important texts in our profession, but it is one of the most relevant and current. author has spent his entire career dedicated to working with adolescents and does so with tremendous care and respect, and this translates into is writing. As a social work educator for almost 20 years, I have never taught a group work course without one of the editions being a required text.
