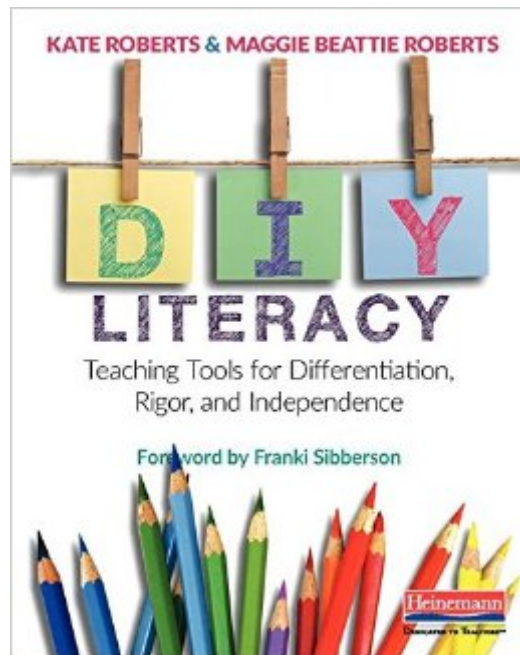

Kate and Maggie Roberts have written a wonderful book about how to make your teaching come alive in a classroom. No longer do you need ditto sheets, pre-made posters, or cardboard cutouts to teach reading and writing. Instead, Kate and Maggie teach us to channel our inner Etsy to help students learn to read and write at higher levels. Each chapter provides funny anecdotes, concrete examples, and wise tips for teaching literacy in elementary and middle school. A brief summary of each chapter: Chapter One explains the role of teaching tools, why we use them, and how they help kids learn. Chapter Two introduces the four main tools they present across the book: teaching charts, demonstration notebooks, micro-progressions, and bookmarks. They explain a little about each tool and show you how to make each one. "Bonus Chapter" gives tips and advice for how to find and create the teaching skills and strategies that go along with the tools. A MUST-READ chapter for teachers of reading and writing! Chapters Three through Five show you how to create tools that address major concerns for teachers across the country: independence, rigor, and differentiation. Chapter Six give additional tips for making tools well. It describes predictable problems teachers and students face when making/teaching/using tools, and offers possible solutions to those predictable problems. Overall, the book is a helpful way to encourage teachers to become more invested in the teaching they do for their kids, making it more personal and engaging. My only bone to pick is that I wish they wrote more about how to TAKE AWAY certain tools once kids become independent learners who applies skills and strategies with automaticity. They address this a bit at the end of chapters 3-5, but I wanted more! Great book to read with your grade level team as a professional book club book. Bravo, Kate and Maggie!
